My Brother Knights,

As Fall advances and we witness dying of nature recognizing that it will return in glorious color in just a few months as a gift from the Divine Creator. But November is also a time in which we reflect on those who have gone before us and we will see again only on the Day of the Lord.

Two thoughts come to mind at this time. Too often Catholic families put off the recognition of the fragility of life. They do not prepare for the final moments of our earthly existence. For our families we should not hesitate to make a will. We owe it to those we leave behind to express our desires for the distribution of our goods, to remind them to pray for the deceased. As my family has passed I decided that I should have a health proxy if I became unable to establish my intentions for treatments. The Church believes a health proxy is superior to the so-called "living will'. Another document should call for the preparation of the funeral mass and burial. I am concerned that too often good families hesitate to call the parish. They say they don't want to upset their loved one. For their eventual journey all people deserve the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of the Sick, the Holy Eucharist, and the Absolution for their sins.

Second, all brothers should make an effort to create and attend a Mass for our deceased Brother Knights. On a Council or Chapter level we should remember those who formed us as knights and participated with us in works of faith and charity. Their families as well appreciate that their beloved are remembered by the Church and Order they served.

Let us rejoice in the God who creates, redeems, and awaits to embrace us all with His divine mercy.

Columbian Award

• Columbian Award - councils are required to complete 16 programs - 4 in each category of Faith, Family, Community and Life. There are 4 featured programs in each of the categories, making it much easier for all councils to achieve the Columbian Award.

Past Due Supreme Forms - Please Submit These Important Annual Forms:

- Form #185 Report of Officers Chosen for the Term due June 30.
- Form #365 Service Program Personnel Report due July 1. This form is critical to starting the process of safe environment certification.
- Form #1295 Semiannual Council Audit Report due August 15.

Safe Environment Compliant:

- Safe Environment Program a requirement for 4 positions:
- Grand Knight training
- Program Director training
- Family Director training and background check
- Community Director training and background check
- Councils need to be Safe Environment compliant early.
- Safe Environment compliance is required for all awards, including the Star Council award.
- Updated Safe Environment requirements (see kofc.org/safe for details).

The ability to talk to parents, especially fathers, stressing the importance of joining the Knights of Columbus and the example it will provide their children, not to mention the NYS High School Tuition Scholarship Program available to children of members. You may want to reach out other organizations like the Veterans (VFW/AMVETs), Sons of Italy, or PAL to name a few. Ideally start talking and learning about their roadblocks and potentially doing joint functions or providing them with help and support for events or activities. You may want to reach out to local municipalities to volunteer for an upcoming event. This will give you the opportunity to expand your reach, and drive awareness of the Knights of Columbus (especially to non-practicing Catholics)- remember: EXPOSURE, EXPOSURE. You can always ask to set up a table to provide material about the Knights of Columbus, benefits of being a Knights, information about your Council.

Unlocking doors to new membership opportunities also allow you to position your Council Halls for functions and new revenue possibilities. Partnering with businesses and organizations could create new channels for donations and support for your activities. These are examples of new ways to think about growing membership and your Councils. Sometimes our beliefs and views scare people who don't understand- but don't let that stop you from trying. It becomes important to focus and stress the similarities we all have within




Brothers:




All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day: What's the difference?

All Saints' Day is a day Catholics offer prayers to those in purgatory. All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day are related, but they are two separate celebrations. On All Saints' Day there's a call to live as saints, to remind us how we're supposed to live. On All Souls' Day, we're talking about all souls and asking God's mercy for them. "We're talking about those people who have died before us, and their process of getting to heaven, through Christ ... It has its roots all the way back to the fourth century." It is on this day that the Book of the Dead is opened to allow parishioners to write the names of relatives to be remembered. Reverend Richard Donohue, the vicar of Catholic Charities for the Diocese of Birmingham, described that the book is "placed near the altar" and "That's done all through November. It's an All Souls' tradition..."

All Souls' Day is a commemoration of the faithfully departed and is observed primarily in the Catholic Church. Its origins date back to European folklore related to customs of veneration practiced worldwide through evens like the Mexican Day of the Dead (Día de los Muertos) or the Chinese Ghost Festival. To remember the departed, many cultures prepare meals for the souls of the dead, light candles or leave flowers on relatives' graves and some anoint tombstones with holy water or pour milk over them. All Souls 'Day is celebrated November second and if that day happens to fall on a Sunday, the Mass is of All Souls and Morning and Evening Prayer (Lauds and Vespers) for the Dead can be said while people participate. This explains why so many of our Councils hold their Memorial Masses in November.

Each celebration touches on cultural beliefs about the spirit world, honoring the dead and their feasts.



November begins the second third of the Columbian Year. Perhaps it is time to see what we as Knights of Columbus have done to promote Priestly Vocations. It is not hard to remember the admonition of Father Brian in July, "My brothers we are in difficulties as to priestly vocations. No priests No Eucharist. No Eucharist No Church ... As Knights let us respond to this crisis."

Have we supported an activity to promote attendance at Mass by the youth in our parish. Fall brings parish classes to train Altar Servers. Why not present an "Altar Servers" pin to each new server as a sign of our support. Perhaps a call to the Pastor to see if there is a family or individual who cannot afford the Religious Education class fees. Maybe your council can help. It is the youth in the pews and those who are an active part of the Parish community where they meet our priests and religious and possibly hear a call to priestly or professed service.

Have we done anything at our Council, Assembly, or Chapter meeting to promote vocation awareness? There are many presentations, discussions and videos dealing with vocation awareness that are appropriate for the "Good of the Order" at a meeting. Numerous videos and DVDs can be found on your Diocesan Vocations Website, the National Catholic Conference of Catholic Bishops Website (https://www.usccb.org,) Serra Clubs International Website, (https://serrainternational.org) or most Religious Order's Websites.

Invite your Council Chaplain to speak to the council about how he heard Christ's call. Do you have a member whose son is a priest? Maybe he would be willing to share with you how his family reacted to his call.

Let's not forget the seminarians. How about a note of encouragement and reminder that you are praying for them. You might ask them to share their first days at the Seminary this year. There have been some changes in the formation process for priesthood. "What are you studying?" "How's the food?" "What is your parochial assignment for the Fall? How is it going?" His response can be a great story for your Council, Assembly or Chapter newsletter.

In today's Church the job and spiritual and temporal responsibilities of a priest are momentous. Perhaps your Pastor Is the only priest in the parish. Perhaps he has the responsibility for neighboring parishes without a Pastor as well. Wouldn't it be nice to encourage your members to be an active part of the life of the parish. Remind them to say hello to Father at the end of Mass. Does the parish need ushers, Eucharist Ministers or other help? One less job to worry about can be a great sign of support for the Pastor and his ministry.

Prayer at home and at meetings help to make these happen!

Did you know Thanksgiving is a Catholic holiday?

True, it's not on the Church calendar. And it is celebrated only in America, whereas Church holidays are universal. Our national holiday is certainly an event that has taken on a life of its own, with an established tradition involving turkey and mashed potatoes, football, shopping, and a four-day weekend—which is fascinating since none of those things have anything to do with the original event that gave rise to annual celebration on the fourth Thursday in November. But any time a nation does anything in unison that involves families getting together and counting their blessings, it is a good thing. "Thanks," says G.K. Chesterton, "is the highest form of thought." And he mentions the fact that the worst moment for an atheist is when he is thankful and suddenly realizes he has no one to thank.

But what is the origin of this holiday?

What most people believe is a variation on what I was taught in public school in the 1960s. The Pilgrims came to Plymouth on a ship called the *Mayflower*. They were the first English settlers in America. They came for religious freedom. And they had a big feast with Indians, and that was the first Thanksgiving. That about sums it up. And that is what Chesterton calls "The Myth of the *Mayflower*." First of all, they were not known as "pilgrims" till about 200 years afterwards. They were Puritans, a radical Anglican "low church" sect that loathed the "high church" Anglicans that happened to include the King of England. In fact, about 30 years after the Puritans arrived in America, some of their fellow Puritans back in England arranged for King Charles I to have his head chopped off.

Secondly, there were at least nine other British settlements before the Plymouth colony. In fact, one of them was at Plymouth. All but one of them failed, including the first settlement at Plymouth. The Puritans who came to Plymouth in 1620 almost didn't survive. Half the settlers died the first winter. They were saved by a Native American named Squanto, who taught them how to hunt and fish and grow corn.

But here's what is really interesting: Squanto was a Roman Catholic.

In 1614, he had been captured by an English party led by Captain John Smith (of Pocahontas fame) and taken on a ship to Spain where he was to be sold as a slave. He was rescued by some Dominican friars who instructed him in the Catholic faith. He told them he wanted to return to his people in America. They helped him get to England, where he met John Slaney, who taught him English and arranged for him to get to Newfoundland. Squanto served as an interpreter between the English and the


Indians and crossed the Atlantic six times. He was never able to return to his own tribe, because they had been wiped out in a plague.

After he came to the aid of the Plymouth settlers, helping them grow their own food, he arranged for a joint harvest feast with the local Wampanoag tribe. It was this event that is the basis of our Thanksgiving holiday. So Thanksgiving was started by a Native American Catholic. Ironically, the Wampanoag tribe later took Squanto hostage because they distrusted him, and he was rescued by the English. It is possible that the Indians poisoned him, which led to his death shortly afterwards in 1622. And then there is this other thing we never learned in school: In 1621, the year after the Puritans arrived at Plymouth, another group of English settlers arrived in Ferry, Newfoundland. The land had been granted to George Calvert, the First Baron of Baltimore. Calvert's son, Cecilius, the Second Baron of Baltimore, was granted another chunk of the New World, which he settled in 1632. He called it Maryland. Why did England give this land to George Calvert and his son? As compensation for the fact the George Calvert had been stripped of his title of Secretary State. And why had he been stripped of his title? Because he declared that he was a Roman Catholic. Maryland (named for some woman whose name was Mary) was the first English Catholic settlement in the New World, and one of its founding principles was... freedom of religion.

The Puritans up the coast get all the credit for establishing freedom of religion, but they did not do it. They were actually quite opposed to the idea. They were anything but tolerant. In fact, it was their intolerance that caused them to come to the new world, not persecution. England was not Puritan enough for them. They did not think the Stuarts had gone far enough to do away with the elements of Catholicism that still remained in the Church of England. Puritan intolerance led the eventual execution of King Charles I (whose wife and children were Catholic). Puritan intolerance was further demonstrated by a course of events in another Puritan settlement established just six years after the one in Plymouth, just down the road, had there been a road. It was called Salem. It was there that anyone who departed from a strict Puritan practice was in danger of being burned as a witch. Chesterton points out that the Puritans lost their belief in priests but kept their belief in witches.

So the Catholics deserve the credit not only for the first Thanksgiving, but for the first real religious freedom in America. Not the Puritans whom we call Pilgrims. It is perhaps why G.K. Chesterton says that England should also celebrate Thanksgiving—in thanks that the Pilgrims *left* England!



The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild promotes the cause for sainthood of the founder of the Knights of Columbus, who was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020. Members of the Guild, and anyone devoted to Father McGivney, can play an active role in the cause by praying for his intercession in times of need, especially in cases of serious illness, and reporting to the Guild any favors received.

Membership in the Guild is free and open to anyone who is devoted to Father McGivney and wishes to invoke his intercession and assist in his sainthood cause through prayer. Members receive a quarterly newsletter and are remembered in a weekly Mass offered for their intentions.

Catholic men who wish to live out the vision and mission of Father McGivney are invited to join the Knights of Columbus and become part of a network of charity, unity and fraternity that serves local parishes and communities. Father McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882 in New Haven, Conn., and died at the age of 38 in 1890. His cause for sainthood was opened in 1997, and his heroic virtue was recognized by the Vatican in March 2008, when he was declared a Venerable Servant of God by Pope Benedict XVI.

On May 26, 2020, Father McGivney took another step toward sainthood when Pope Francis approved the promulgation of a decree recognizing a miracle attributed to his intercession. With the approval of this miracle, he was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020, with the title of Blessed.

Another miracle through his intercession is needed for him to be canonized as a saint.

Those devoted to Father McGivney are encouraged to recite regularly the prayer for his canonization, which is available online and on a special prayer card. You may Report favors through this website or by email or regular mail at the addresses listed below.

To request a third-class relic or to order devotional items, click on the online form link. Print out the form, fill it out and mail it to the Father McGivney Guild.
